Technology Support Model

School Board Work Study February 22, 2016

Background:

Infrastructure and Devices: White Bear's technology landscape has changed dramatically over the past five years. We have improved network reliability, access, security and speed. Additionally, we have added over 6,000 student devices. We deploy fewer PC's each year and since MDE now supports classroom-based testing on Chromebooks, we have phased out nearly all elementary computer labs. The tools are in place to personalize learning.

Staffing: There was a time when computer aids primarily managed computer labs, monitored student computer use, monitored assessments and provided building technology support. Support protocols have been based on these past practice and positions have remained the same although needs have shifted. Moreover, many of our technical staff report to principals rather than to the technology department. This approach does not address our current or projected demands.

Instructional Support: White Bear's needs have shifted. 76% of students report using technology daily in the classroom. Indeed, we have solid adoption of technology which will continue to grow as our 1:1 expands to cover grades 3 through 12. This is the time to expand best practice use of technology. Differentiated support that empowers staff to put new ideas immediately into practice is key to accomplishing this goal. Focusing this support on digital citizenship and the 4C's of Communication, Collaboration, Critical Thinking and Creativity will maximize the learning impact of our technology investment.

Goal:

In order to provide the necessary level of technical support, prepare for the future, and maximize the learning impact of our technology investment, we will develop a comprehensive plan to accomplish the following:

- Improve the quality and responsiveness of technical support.
- Increase job-embedded 4C's instructional support.
- Assure that our support team has the balanced skill sets necessary to address technical and instructional needs.

- Benchmark our goal against industry best practice.
